National Listening and Speaking Group

In the week leading up to our 35th anniversary celebration, L'Arche Hobart was honoured to host a meeting of the National Listening and Speaking Group, some of whom were able to stay to take part in our celebration. Here is their report.



News from the L'Arche Australia National Listening and Speaking group.

We were delighted to be able to finally meet each other in person after having met via Zoom for the last year. It was also wonderful to be able to travel to Hobart and be offered such wonderful hospitality from our friends from L'Arche Beni-Abbes. Thanks for having us.

Our theme for this meeting was "Moving Forward".



We welcomed Garry Freeman, our newest representative from Beni-Abbes. (Each community has two reps, although the Brisbane people were unable to attend this gathering. Rosey Dean is our other representative.) It is so good that Garry has agreed to take up this important role. We also valued his contributions as a musician throughout the week.

After representatives presented news from their communities, we got on with some of our other work. There was follow up from our feedback to the government on the Values and Attitudes Paper, and update on the L'Arche

Australia Mandate process and then our response to the next stage of the International Charter Process.

Representatives reviewed their beads and chose the three beads that they agreed showed the most important ideas that they wanted to be included in the Charter.

There was news about the Companions Retreat, some work on L'Arche traditions and then two sessions called Justice for All. We had some honest, and at times difficult, conversations about the good and hard things about living with the experience of an intellectual disability in Australia. People shared their personal experiences and some experiences of other members of their community in a sensitive and private way. We talked about how we could influence change in Australia and make sure that people with a disability have the respect that they deserve as Australians.

We were very lucky to be able to host a screening of Michael McDonald's new film "6000 Waiting". It is a very powerful and moving film. We also met with Michael and Nick and Naomi, two people

who feature in the film, for a Q & A session via Zoom after we'd watched the film. They told us why the film was made and how making it has made a difference to them. It was so good to listen to their stories. Nick is a man in his 40's who has lived in a nursing home for the last three years because he cannot get the funding and support he needs to live in his own home. He and

others are fighting for this unfair system to be changed.

The last part of our meeting included making short films called "I Am". This helps us all to practise our public speaking skills and get used to talking to the camera. We are getting really good at this.

Finally, David Treanor came to speak with us and catch us up with news from L'Arche Australia and the Federation and lastly, we prepared our report for the L'Arche Australia Board. We do manage to pack a lot into just a few days whenever we meet.

We also had a great shared meal at 40 which turned into a fun music session. We also enjoyed a meal out together at the Maypole Hotel and in free time some people got to see some of the sights of Hobart. A busy, informative and fun few days.



Eileen Glass - The Gift of L'Arche Hobart

While she was in Hobart for our 35th anniversary celebration, Eileen kindly gave a public talk on the gift of L'Arche Hobart to the wider Larche family. Here is a summary of her key points.

What the foundation of L'Arche Hobart, Beni-Abbes brought to the development of L'Arche in Australia

L'Arche in Australia grew rapidly in the early years. L'Arche Canberra began 1978. Emmaus Cottage at Milton NSW, at the end of 1981, and L'Arche Sydney in 1983. So the foundation in Hobart in 1986 was the fourth in eight years.

Until 1986, the communities were no more than three hours apart by car so it was relatively easy to exchange visits, to send assistants from one community to another for support and experience, Board members could get to know one another. It was relatively easy to plan formation sessions, retreats and regional gatherings.

L'Arche Hobart opened the horizons of L'Arche Australia

Australia was the only country in L'Arche in the southern hemisphere, our communities were small, and modestly resourced, so we had to be creative and intentional in supporting one another and growing our links with the International Federation.

That learning stood us in good stead when L'Arche Brisbane was established ten years later, followed by the foundations in Melbourne and Perth.

The evolution of the governance structures of L'Arche Australia

The first three communities were established under the incorporation of L'Arche Australia, with the local committee in each place as a subcommittee of the national board.

By 1986, L'Arche Beni-Abbes was operating under its own incorporation and joined the Board of L'Arche Australia as a corporate member. L'Arche Australia had to be open to finding the governance structures which best fit a community in the developmental stages.

In 1982, the Region of Australia became part of L'Arche International, and of seven national leaders since, three have come from L'Arche Hobart.

Lilian Sutton, John Coleman and David Treanor have each contributed significantly to the development of L'Arche in Australia. Each one has been appreciated for their contribution to the International Federation.

L'Arche Hobart/Beni-Abbes has experienced seasons of flourishing and seasons of struggle and diminishment over the past 35 years. During those years:

The community has been a powerful witness to the transforming power of faithful friendships lived in a spirit of mutuality, forgiveness, love and joy.

The world of people with an Intellectual disability has changed, so their needs have changed.

The wider community of Hobart has changed and L'Arche Beni-Abbes has become part of the story of Hobart.



The task facing the community today is to listen attentively to the call that is unfolding in this particular season of their life.

Who will lead the community into the new vision for the future?

A leader formed in L'Arche, with an ability to lead people in living the mission, a courageous person who is committed over time and able to work in partnership with the Board. The Board must be clear its responsibility is to exercise governance at the service of the mission.

The founding of L'Arche Hobart was the work of years and it yielded rich fruit. The renewal of L'Arche Hobart will take time, and like all work done in faith it will yield rich fruit.
